## MLA Style - In-text Citation

### **In-Text Citations - Direct quotations**

A parenthetical citation includes the author's last name and the page number(s) of the information used.

Romantic poetry is characterized by the "spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings" (Wordsworth 263).

### <u>OR</u>

Wordsworth stated that Romantic poetry was marked by a "spontaneous overflow of powerful feelings" (263).

# MLA Style - In-text Citation

### **In-Text Citations - Paraphrasing**

When you write information or ideas from a source in your own words, cite the source by adding an in-text citation at the end of the paraphrased portion.

Kafka describes the insecurities of his youth, analyzing his social shortcomings in school and his rocky relationship with his father (44-46).


### <u>OR</u>

The insecurities of youth are described, as the author analyzes his social shortcomings in school and his rocky relationship with his father (Kafka 44-46).

## **MLA Style - In-text Citation**

#### **In-Text Citations - Reminder**

- No Author Name
  If the author's name is not given, then use the first word or words of the title. Follow the same formatting that was used in the works cited list, such as quotation marks.
- Electronic Source without page number
  When you quote from electronic sources that do not provide page numbers (like webpages), cite the author name only.



#### **Authors**

- Last name first, Give surnames and given names in full if possible.
- If there are two authors, the first author given name appears in <u>last name</u>, first name format; second author's name appears in <u>first name last name format</u>.
- If there are three or more authors, list only the first author followed by the phrase "et al." (means "and other") in place of the subsequent authors' names.

#### **Titles**

- Title of the Book Capitalize all principal words (nouns, verbs, adjectives, etc.). Do not capitalize articles (the, an), prepositions, or conjunctions unless one is the first word of the title or subtitle
- > Italicize titles of larger works like books, periodicals, databases, and websites.
- > Title of the Article Putting the title of the article in quotations marks, and italicizing the periodical title.
- > Title of the Journal Capitalize all words in the journal title (except for common words).

### **Volume and Issue**

- Volume Follows the journal title, separated by a comma and preceded by vol.
- > Issue Follows the volume number, separated by a comma and preceded by **no.**

#### **Publication Date**

- Books Only the year is included in the publication date
- Journal Article If the year is dated with a month or season, the month (abbreviated) or season is cited along with the year
- When the publication date of a work is unknown, omit this element

### **Publisher**

- Use of capital letters in the most important words of titles, not need to italicized
- Use UP for University Press, e.g. Oxford UP

#### **DOIs and URLs**

- Digital Object Identifier (DOI) is a unique alphanumeric string assigned by a registration agency to identify content and provide a persistent link to its location on the internet
- Include a DOI for all works that have a DOI, regardless of whether you used the online version or the print version
- If a print work does not have a DOI, do not include any DOI or URL in the reference
- If an online work has both a DOI and a URL, include only the DOI
- If an online work has a URL but no DOI, include the URL in the reference.


#### **Basic Format of Book**




### **Edited Book, No Author**

### **Basic Format of Journal Article**




### **Electronic Journal Article without DOI**









### Reminder when citing Social Media

- Cite only original contents from social media sites
- If the post contains audiovisual only, provide the description of audiovisuals (In IG case, only give a description of the photo / video, no need to include any related text in the post)
- Do not reproduce emojis in works-cited-list entries.
